

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FROM THE ARCHIVES

With the Archives offering endless material for topics to write about, it can be overwhelming to choose. The idea came to me to delve into the early years and see what types of musical programs were being presented in the month of February. I started with Binder 1, the Early Years of 1920-1953, of Correspondence, Newspaper Clippings, etc. I discovered a variety of musical offerings during the month of February. They ranged from individual and combined chapter member recitals to guest recitalists, to showcasing the Student Audition Winners, to Lent Vespers to a Devotional Service to an extended dedicatory organ recital to programmed recitals of "An Hour of Organ Music," "Forerunners of Bach," "Choir Festivals," and a Twentieth Anniversary Organ Program. Like wow, did I find my topic and then some! So, this month, the Archives shares:

Musical Offerings from the Month of February The Early Years, 1920-1953 Part 1--(1927-1937)

From a membership roster I found among the materials, the Wisconsin Chapter had a small number of members residing and serving churches in the Milwaukee area. Here is added bonus information on this church organ. The new Austin pipe organ was dedicated during the 11:00 morning worship service on January 23, 1927. Following dedication, the 3 manual, 44 stops instrument hosted two recitals. The first recital was on Monday, January 24 with guest recitalist Sheldon Foote and the second recital was on Thursday, January 27 with guest recitalist Stanley Martin. This program on February 13 is a continuation of showcasing this new instrument's varied uses for worship and performance.

The year is 1928, the date is Sunday, February 24, we are at the Church of the Resurrection on 26th and Auer Street at 4 o'clock. Chapter member Frieda J. Diekman is playing a program of organ works and accompanying tenor, Mr. Goetsch. This afternoon's program is for the benefit of the Choir Music Fund. From what I viewed in the Archives, I did not find any specs on the organ to share. What I can share from the archives is that Frieda J. Diekman was one of the core members in those early years, very supportive of the chapter from its infancy.

Our journey brings us to Kenwood Methodist Episcopal Church on East Prospect and Kenwood Boulevard on Sunday, February 17, 1929. At 4 o'clock, Hermann A. Nott, Chapter member, is to perform his organ recital on this newly installed instrument, the Wright Memorial Organ. Mr. Nott will be showcasing, through his program selections, the vast expressive musical interpretations, and beauty through his musical skills. Take a look at his program and the organ specifications. I learned a few new stop names of Harmonic Piccolo and Cornopean.

With a few gaps in years, our February tour continues to Thursday, February 8, 1934, at 8:15 p.m. The Wisconsin Chapter of the American Guild of Organists is hosting recitalist Virgil Fox. The location for this recital is Immanual Presbyterian Church on Astor Street in Milwaukee. Noteworthy, This pipe organ is a relatively new installation at the church having celebrated its pipe organ dedication recital just eight (8) years earlier on October 28, 1926. Could this instrument be turning 100 years old in two years? I will do more research to confirm.

Choir to Pedal

Take a look at Virgil's program, it was quite the musical treat with the variety of compositional periods of works performed. One piece Virgil usually played as his encore piece, "Perpetuum Mobile" was on his program to showcase the organ along with his skillful solo pedal work. I can only imagine, for those who attended this recital, how they were amazed with his organ performance and the ticket price of \$1.50.

The following February of 1935 brings us to Calvary Presbyterian Church on North 10th and West Wisconsin Avenue. On Saturday, February 2 at 4 o'clock chapter members presented a musical program of "Forerunners of Bach." To begin the program, a paper was presented on the "Forerunners of Bach" by Miss Irene Eastman of Madison, Wisconsin. Take a look at the program to see the blend of French, Italian, English, Danish and German composer's works performed. This themed music program presented by the chapter showed their creative approach to setting context with the paper presentation first and the performance that followed.

On Sunday, February 14, 1937, brings us to First Methodist Episcopal Church located on North 10th Street and W. Wisconsin Avenue for a "Choir Festival." The Wisconsin Chapter helped and supported this program which combined 250 voices from 12 churches in Milwaukee and suburbs. The festival at 4:00 pm drew an audience of 1,100! Read through the two articles from the Archives for more details. One interesting fact I discovered; the chapter held a successful "Hymn Service" the prior November at Immanuel Presbyterian Church. This "Choir Festival" was equally successful in that the board planned to make both of these annual events. The credit for both successes was the work and attention to detail of Chapter member Hermann Nott, the chair of the programming committee.

Well, this brings Part 1 to a close. Hope you enjoyed the musical February tour through part of the early years. I have all my research ready for Part 2 for next February. Happy St. Valentine Day and Ash Wednesday on the 14th, Happy Leap Day on the 29th and a prayerful season of renewal this Lent.
